Established more than 30 years ago by a former police officer, <u>Langara's Department of Criminal Justice</u> offers two diplomas. The <u>Diploma in Criminal Justice</u> is highly regarded by those who recruit police officers, corrections staff, and court service employees such as sheriffs. The <u>Diploma in Criminology</u> is intended for students wishing to complete two years of university-transferable credits before transferring to a Bachelor's program at SFU, UBC or other institutions.
