Department Overview

The Department of Applied Planning offers a twelve-month <u>Post-Degree Diploma in Applied Planning</u>. This intensive program is meant for students with an undergraduate degree or equivalent and provides future planners with applied planning skills. Program graduates find work with planning organizations, including local and regional government, consulting firms and First Nations.

Self-Study

Action Plan Goals

In response to the Self-Study and External Review, Applied Planning created an Action Plan with these goals:

- Goal 1: Ensure learning outcomes align with the employment market.
- Goal 2: Ensure program is diverse and inclusive through outreach and admissions.
- Goal 3: Build experiential learning opportunities into a formal program.
- Goal 4: Make more effective use of College resources.
- Goal 5: Strengthen and formalize external connections.

Examples of Post-Review Successes

After consultation with the Dean and faculty, Applied Planning is currently considering options to offer the program fully online to meet demand for this mode of education from current students and graduates.

Discussions are continuing with the Program Advisory Group on the currency of computer applications and need for additional soft skills.

Discussions are ongoing with the Dean about Special Topics offerings.

APPL 5230: Social Planning and Community Development has become a course with real world projects which enables students to pick a topic of focus for their major project. This has also expanded our experiential learning in the program.
