Course Description, Prerequisites, Corequisites:

Fourth-term students will undertake a five-week work-experience internship in print, online or broadcast journalism, public relations, communications or any other journalism-related field. The internship will be preceded by coaching in how to research, write a resume, build a portfolio, and interview for a prospective job, as well as providing a refresher on journalism issues and practices.

Students will receive credit for only one of 2459, 2469, and 2470.

Prerequisite(s): JOUR 1178 and 2278

Registration in this course is restricted to students admitted to the Diploma or Certificate in Journalism.

Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- identify topics of debate around several central issues in contemporary journalism
- analyze how a contemporary news story is conceptualized, developed and delivered in a local setting
- identify one potential area of employment in journalism and develop a list of future job contacts
- identify and arrange an internship opportunity
- write an effective cover letter and resume to develop a suitable application
- prepare a portfolio of previous work for a job application
- employ journalistic skills and standards in a professional work environment
- collaborate with mentors and senior staff members of an approved media outlet or other journalism- or communications-related organization

Students will spend the first part of the term undertaking research on possible opportunities for internships and then will apply for one or more of them under the supervision of the internship coordinator. They will also go through workshops that focus on how to write a cover letter and resume, how to construct a portfolio, how to prepare for a journalism interview, and how to prepare for going to work in a new organization. Students will spend some time in the classroom weeks, as well, reviewing central issues in contemporary journalism and current approaches to newsgathering. They will then spend five weeks at a job site, with oversight from the internship coordinator.
