THE PHOTOGRAPHIC NUDE

Since the invention of the camera, the photographic nude has been an important part of the history of photography.

Through class lectures, studio demos and extensive in-studio shooting experimentation, students are encouraged to explore the nuances of light on the human form.

Working with professional models, students will learn how to create the different moods of the nude, which is the result of the chemistry that exists between the camera, the photographer, the model and the sculpting faculties of light.
