WHAT IS THE KITS-FAIRVIEW COMMUNITY POLICING CENTRE?

The Kits-Fairview CPC is one of ten community-policing centres in the Vancouver area. The role of the CPC is to promote crime prevention, and community safety and unity through a wide range of programs, events, services and initiatives.

HOW TO BECOME A VOLUNTEER

- -Ability to fill out an application from at the Kits-Fair CPC Office.
- -Minimum 19 years of age
- -Have a good English communication skills. (spoken & written)
- -Consent to and pass a criminal record check.

WHAT WE DO

Street-Front Office - Victim Information Services

Through the street-front office, volunteers, staff and the Neighbourhood Police Officer (NPO) record and respond to citizens' crime and safety complaints and concerns. We receive found property and provide community resource information and referrals. We also receive valuable information about crime in the community. Kitsilano Fairview CPC office volunteers and staff work closely with City staff on civic-related complaints and concerns such as graffiti, noise complaints, and damaged public property.

Community Outreach and Special Events

Kitsilano Fairview CPC Staff, volunteers, and the NPO attend numerous community events throughout the year at schools, community centres and neighbourhood houses to give presentations, provide crime prevention and community policing information.

Foot Patrol and Bike Patrol

Volunteers patrol the neighborhood while walking and riding their bikes. The purpose of these patrols is to increase presence in problem areas and record and report suspicious and criminal activity. Volunteers perform security audits of neighbourhood vehicles, check for anti-theft equipment, as well as identify and recover stolen and abandoned vehicles. Patrol volunteers also distribute crime prevention information, and crime alerts.

Speed Watch

The Speed Watch program is run in conjunction with ICBC. Our volunteer members set up radar equipment at "hot spots" throughout the community. We set up a radar and display vehicle speeds to motorists. We record each vehicle's speed and forward these numbers to ICBC and the police department to be analyzed.
