Description

In this course you look at technical library systems from a user perspective, with a focus on accessibility. You will try several different library systems to manage assets, organize information, and design interfaces. You will learn the skills to design databases and you will explore software for libraries. You will learn about user experience, information architecture, and usability.

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Learning Outcomes

At the end of this course you will be able to determine the appropriate use of and be comfortable using a variety of systems pertaining to information storage, retrieval, and transfer. You will be able to:

- Select, compile, and evaluate information for bibliographies using various library systems.
- Use content management systems (CMS) and describe their role in the context of the library.
- Identify basic HTML tags in order to make simple aesthetic changes to websites from a user-centered design perspective.
- Develop a user needs analysis and create text-based information databases based on user needs and sound information organization principles.
- Create and evaluate effective library and information-oriented systems and websites incorporating user experience and design principles.
- Explain key issues relating to information access, and other important concepts relating to library systems.
