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Langara Library is at the heart of a vibrant, engaging and exciting educational experience, and an essential contributor to academic excellence – a progressive academic library, fully integrated with the teaching, learning, and research at Langara College.



Introduction.

During 2013/14, the Library built upon the strategic visioning project undertaken in 2012/13. Consultants guiding the project included two recommendations in their final report to the Library Strategic Vision Steering Committee. This year, the Library successfully implemented both recommendations:

We recommend that the Library Director's position be filled as soon as possible.

• The position Director, Academic Innovation has been created, expanding this administrative role to include Educational Technology and the Teaching & Curriculum Development Centre, two areas identified in the Strategic Plan as key partners for the Library.

At Langara, the Library Director should report to the Vice-President Academic and Provost.

• The Director, Academic Innovation, and therefore the Library, will report directly to the Provost/VP Academic & Students.

The Langara College Library Strategic Plan 2013-2020: Contributing to Academic Excellence for the 21st Century was shared with the broader Langara community and Library employees embraced its direction. Activities during the Annual Planning Day in May connected the Library's strategic plan to that of the College and ensured any new initiatives reflected Langara's "refreshed" priorities.

Working groups successfully:

- Developed the Library's visual identity, entitled "Curiosity," which is reflected in the design of this annual report.
- Strengthened the Library's position as Langara's copyright knowledge centre with a suite of policies and a robust web presence.
- Informally connected with the Teaching and Curriculum Development Centre with plans to develop a more formal relationship next year.
- Implemented and held regular IT/Library meetings to communicate upcoming initiatives, provide supporting data where possible and follow up on pending issues or concerns.

Succession planning is an ongoing focus. Annie Jensen has started learning about media librarianship in anticipation of Susan Weber's retirement in June 2014.

As Langara launches its first Academic Plan, the Library will participate on several Action Groups, further ensuring we connect to the academic vision of the College.

The hiring process of Director, Academic Innovation concluded at the beginning of April 2014. Patricia Cia takes on the new role effective July 2014.





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TEACHING STUDENTS IN PERSON AND ONLINE

Highlights from a year of instruction include:

- Setting a new record for the amount of instruction sessions • delivered by the Library – the Library offered 424 classes face-toface and online.
- The debut of a new Avoiding Plagiarism tutorial in Fall 2013 on Langara's Desire2Learn (D2L) online learning platform. The tutorial features video interviews with five Langara instructors, who discuss plagiarism within their disciplines. The tutorial has had excellent uptake-nine departments currently make use of it - and has been posted online as a seven-part YouTube series.
- With assistance from Institutional Research, the Library conducted its second Faculty Survey of Library Instruction Services. 115 instructors responded to the survey and feedback was overwhelmingly positive.

The spike in instructional classes can be attributed to the increased interest in online tutorials in the Spring term. The number of participants in Spring 2014 online tutorials almost doubled from Spring 2013.

COMMENTS FROM INSTRUCTION SURVEY

On Library Instruction...

- 44 Gave the students the needed resources for my class, and in having a librarian visit our class, the students felt that they had someone they could go to for help."
- 44 Increases students' awareness and understanding of how to incorporate research so as to strengthen their writing."
- 44 Is absolutely necessary to my students' success, and should be compulsory for all courses at Langara that require a written assignment."

OTHER FINDINGS FROM THE LIBRARY INSTRUCTION SURVEY:

- All respondents (100%) found the process of booking classes with our librarians to be 'Good' or 'Very Good.'
- The vast majority of respondents (97%) rated the content of in-class sessions to be 'Good' or 'Very Good.'
- Most respondents (78%) found the quality of a tailored Assignment Guide for students to be 'Good' or 'Very Good,' while 19% of respondents did not request/receive an Assignment Guide as part of the instruction process.

Curated, seamless, dynamic.

CONTENT & RESOURCES

The Library remains the College's primary agent for acquiring and curating content in a cost effective and efficient manner, taking advantage of external sources, consortia and shared services.

The Langara Library's collection continues to evolve to better meet the needs of our patrons in a rapidly changing information landscape.

As our content evolves, so do our processes. At the end of 2013/14:

- The majority of our resources can be accessed remotely
- Our community plays an active role in our collection development
- The discovery process is seamless and intuitive

ENCORE ES

The Library chose Encore ES as its new discovery platform. Encore ES integrates full-text article results with library catalogue results, creating a single relevance-ranked stream of library resources within an intuitive interface. In June, after months of direct collaboration with developers at Innovative Interfaces, EBSCO, and other libraries in the beta test group, Langara Library was the first site worldwide to go live with Encore ES.

ART BOOK DONATION

Approximately 1,500 art books were donated to the Library by a community member. Fine Arts liaison librarian Joyce Wong worked with instructors and other librarians to select the most relevant material, and Technical Services staff members cataloged, processed and prepared the books for use at Langara. We ultimately added 528 art books to our collection.


COPYRIGHT

Langara opted out of its license agreement with Access Copyright in August 2013, joining 59 other Association of Canadian Community Colleges (ACCC) member institutions in ending a formal relationship with the organization.

The Library continued to support the College's copyright needs throughout 2013/14, by:

- Developing an extensive copyright website that incorporates Collegeapproved policies and directives
- Facilitating copyright workshops for departments on campus
- Forming a college-wide Copyright Advisory Committee
- Providing copyright consultation services to instructors
- Exploring copyright compliance software compatible with the D2L platform
- Continuing to develop in-house expertise through staff training





Subject Librarians work closely with their departments to determine the appropriate content and format that help students succeed in their course work. Business and Nursing tend to require more specialized and expensive resources.


"JUST IN TIME" COLLECTION STRATEGY

Through demand-driven acquisition (DDA), our users trigger loans or purchases of ebooks pre-selected by Langara subject librarians. This year, the Library expanded its DDA program to include both Ebrary and EBSCO as vendors, resulting in 87 ebook purchases and 556 short-term loans.

TitanFile

The Library also improved the convenience, visibility and ease of use of our interlibrary loans service. We streamlined our online forms, launched TitanFile online article delivery, and focused on quick turnaround times. Interlibrary loan requests increased by almost 40% over the previous year, and article requests more than doubled.

InterLibrary Loan Requests Filled




ELECTRONIC RESOURCES


The Library's collection continues to reflect the shifting research habits of our students and faculty. Digital resources, which can be accessed by our community anytime and anywhere, consumed 61% of the Library's collections budget in 2013/14. Electronic resources include online journals, books, streaming media, and other online resources.

Electronic expenditures by division










Total titles in collection at year end


Online views*



Learning Commons.

Launched in 2012 and located on the 1st Floor of the Library, the Learning Commons provides customized academic support, including peer tutoring, learning skills workshops, and writing and research help.

THE SPACE

This year, the Learning Commons underwent renovations to expand its teaching and learning space.

Expanded teaching capacity

A new layout and combination of desktop and laptop seating increased the capacity of the Teaching Lab from 20 to 35 seats. When not in use for instruction by the Library and Learning Commons and its partners, the Teaching Lab serves as one of the few drop-in labs on campus.

Refreshed Smart Tables technology

To accommodate the increasing variety of technologies used by students, the Learning Commons' Smart Tables were upgraded with high resolution monitors and a variety of compatible adapters. Students can now seamlessly connect their devices to the Smart Table monitors.

Improved access to learning technologies

Formerly a lab dedicated to students registered with Langara's Disability Services, the Adaptive Lab was converted into a Learning Technology Lab open to all students. The addition of 2 computer stations allows Disability Services staff to offer specialized student training in the lab. To date, 22 sessions have been offered on a wide range of assistive technology applications such as Kurzweil 3000 and Dragon.




Improved tutoring services To expand the skills of the Learning Commons tutors, an online training tutorial was developed for a Fall 2014 launch. The tutorial covers such topics as basic tutoring principles, how to's, and role-play videos to illustrate challenging situations. The tutorial was developed with the generous support of the BCIT Learning Commons, who shared their training materials for our

The Learning Commons continues to expand tutoring services to students from a wide array of subject areas. With the addition of Psychology to our subject areas in September 2013, students can now receive tutoring services in seven subjects: Accounting, Biology, Chemistry, Computer Science, Nursing Biology, Physics and Psychology. The Learning Commons also plays a role in linking students with additional tutoring services. For instance, the Learning Commons website now features information on the Geography Lab's services and hours.

Collaborative Workshops

In 2013/14, the Learning Commons hosted a wide range of workshops to assist students with their academic success, such as:

- The Counselling Department's Student Success Workshops, with topics like time management, note-taking and exam preparation.
- Sean Maschmann from the History Department led a well-attended workshop on the essentials of essay writing.
- The Library offered a number of "Citation Bootcamp" workshops, teaching students how to cite sources.

COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

2013/14 provided countless opportunities for the Library to engage with the College community and share our stories and successes.

CONNECTING WITH THE COLLEGE COMMUNITY

Highlights from a year of engagement with the College community:

- The Learning Commons held a successful Employee Open House in June. Treats included ice-cream, special toppings, and tours of the Learning Commons. The Learning Commons also held an Open House for students on Sept. 4, 2013. Stations were set up in the Learning Commons to highlight the Writing and Tutoring Centre, the Library's Research Help Service and the Smart Tables. The Langara Counselling Department also offered small group sessions on career planning and college transition during the Open House.
- We hosted an extremely popular "Treats and Sweets" party in February, inviting all Langara employees to browse highlights from the Library collection, sample gourmet desserts baked by librarians, and take home a free art book.
- The Library brought its services and collections outside of its physical walls by participating in College-wide celebrations like Welcome Week, International Education Week, and the Langara Pride Fair. Our thematic film screenings and pop-up mini-Library tables were popular with students and employees alike.

- The Library showed off its Langara spirit, participating as a team in many cross-campus activities such as Pink Shirt Day and the Halloween Decoration Contest.
- Langara Design Formation and Fine Arts students continue to showcase their works with Librarybased displays throughout the year, such as "Paperbag Couture" and ongoing photographic exhibitions.
- The Library hosted live-streaming of the 2014 TED Talks held in Vancouver, with many Langara faculty, staff and students dropping in for the powerful and inspiring sessions.
- A team of Library employees collaborated with the Langara Communications and Marketing (C&M) department to develop a unique visual identity for the Library, which will roll out in Fall 2014.





SHARING OUR SUCCESSES



- The Library's implementation of Encore ES provided many opportunities to share our story:
 - A spotlight article in the July 2013 issue of Innovative Interfaces' *INNBrief* newsletter.
 - Innovative Interfaces unveiled Encore ES at the annual American Library Association (ALA) Conference using Langara Library as their demonstration site.
 - Electronic Resources Librarian Emma Lawson and representatives from Innovative Interfaces and EBSCO gave a joint presentation on library discovery at the well-respected Charleston Conference.
 - Brent Searle (Manager, Library Systems) was interviewed for an upcoming article in *Information Today.*

- We presented two projects at Langara's 2nd annual Applied Research Showcase:
 - Langara Library's Avoiding Plagiarism Tutorial: A Collaborative Approach.
 Copyright Librarian Lindsay Tripp and University of British Columbia iSchool student Amber Saundry presented the Library's new plagiarism tutorial, which was developed with quantitative and qualitative feedback from the campus community.
 - Library Discovery Service: Finding the Best Fit. Representatives from the Library presented on their rigorous evaluation of EBSCO ES, a process that included focus groups, a survey, and task testing.
