BC's post-secondary system has been neglected for far too long. The system we rely on today was funded on the backs of international students, who filled gaps left by declining government support. Funding per student has dropped 17% since 2006/07, leaving institutions like Langara scrambling to do more with less. The result? Higher tuition, fewer courses, and lost faculty jobs all while the province calls for more nurses, teachers, tech workers, and skilled professionals. Students are paying the price, and I refuse to let that continue.

During my time on the Board, I've been a strong voice for students, voting for policies and decisions that put them first. I proudly supported Future Focused Langara, our bold new framework that reorganizes programs into six Academic Centres. These centres help students move quickly from the classroom into real-world jobs, giving them hands-on experience, career connections, and the skills employers need.

Post-secondary challenges cannot be solved by Langara alone. They require both provincial and federal action. The provincial government has made it clear they will not increase funding, blaming fiscal pressures, but students and faculty should not pay for government overspending and deficits. Even though it's not required of me as a Board member, I will personally petition the provincial government—whether for a review of the funding formula or policies that protect student opportunities and quality education. My experience in student leadership, community advocacy, and working with government has prepared me to navigate institutional decision-making, organize effectively, and push for meaningful change.
