Why Libraries?


- Median annual income for library technicians is \$62,422 in B.C. (median hourly wage: \$29.93/hr)
- Average earnings between \$42,130 to \$72,996



Where do Library Technicians work?

Library Technicians and Assistants Section (LTAS) of the British Columbia Library Association's 2013 survey, responded to by individuals from 7 provinces and 1 from out of country, indicates the approximate percentage of technicians and assistants is distributed as following:



Why Langara?

- Recognized across Canada.
- One of only two programs in BC.
- Courses offered in Fall and Spring.
- Usually only one course during the summer (often it is online).
- Flexible participation options is entirely online.
- In person option is entirely on campus.
- Hybrid allows you to study with a combination of online and on-campus courses.



Admission Requirements

BC Grade 12 graduation (or equivalent) or 19 years of age or older.

English category 2

- 70% English 12
- LET 3
- IELTS 6.5



All intakes offer Flexible Participation, meaning you can study part time, full time, in person or through online instruction.

Admissions Process

All necessary documents must be submitted to Registrar and Enrolment Services.

- 1. Completed Application Form
- 2. Official Transcripts
- 3. Letter of Intent indicating what makes you a good candidate, and what are your experiences with libraries?
- 4. Interview and testing



Program Intakes

Langara offers 3 intakes per year.

Applications open 11 months in advance of each intake.

Fall Intake (September start)







Registration begins in June

Spring Intake (January start)

- Interview/testing begins in October
- Registration begins in November

Summer Intake (May start)

- Interview/testing begin in February
 - ebruary <u>L</u>
- Registration begins in March



Interview and Testing

Interview

- Meet with faculty and have a conversation about yourself and the reasons why you want to enter the program.
- In person or online

Computer Usage Survey

 Complete the survey indicating your level of familiarity of using current technology, social media, and equipment.

Test

- Filing exercise
- Short paragraph answers related to the career and/or library industry
- Conducted online
- 90 minutes

Selection Criteria

- 1. Academic ability (assessed based on grades)
- 2. Library/information work experience (including volunteer)
- Work experience / involvement in other fields indirectly related to libraries (i.e. teaching experience, computer training)
- 4. Ongoing interest as a library user
- Aptitude or experience with computers or automated environments
- 6. Ability to communicate in writing
- 7. Ability to communicate orally
- 3. Ability to organize information and follow written instructions
- 9. General knowledge and evidence of well-rounded interests



Criminal Record Check

A Criminal Record Check (CRC) is expected for many library jobs and practicum placements.

AFTER acceptance into the program, you will be requested to start the CRC process.*

Students will not be able to register for second term and onward without completing the CRC process.

*A link to the CRC form will be sent in an email after your acceptance.

Flexible Participation (Online) Students must:

- take one to five courses each term

Workload

We recommend that students budget

10-15 hours per week per course
