

- Part time, on call, and temporary contracts to start
 - Evening and weekend work is common
 - 35 40 hours per week



All intakes offer Flexible Participation, meaning you can study part time, full time, in person or through online instruction.

Admissions Process

All necessary documents must be submitted to Registrar and Enrolment Services.

- 1. Completed Application Form
- 2. Official Transcripts
- 3. Letter of Intent indicating what makes you a good candidate, and what are your experiences with libraries?
- 4. Interview and testing



Program Intakes

Langara offers 3 intakes per year. Applications open 11 months in advance of each intake.

Fall Intake (September start) 🚨 🖳

- Interview/testing begin in April
- Registration begins in June

Spring Intake (January start) 🖵

- Interview/testing begins in October
- Registration begins in November

Summer Intake (May start) 🖵

- Interview/testing begin in February
- Registration begins in March






