Course Description, Prerequisites, Corequisites:

A firsthand account of a collective experience is a powerful historical document. The culmination of the Writing Lives project involves the generation of a first-person memoir in collaboration with a survivor. Integrating knowledge gained in Writing Lives I, students work in groups to establish interview protocols, conduct and transcribe interviews with a survivor, and shape the material into a memoir, which they revise and edit in collaboration with their interview subject. Students plan a closing event to present a copy of the memoir to their collaborator and mark the conclusion of the project.

Prerequisites:: A minimum "C" grade in ENGL 2226.

Learning Outcomes:

Upon successful completion of this course, students will be able to...

- Describe their relationship to the Land and develop a culturally sensitive land acknowledgement that is specific to their locale.
- Reflect on how their identity and experience inform and impact their relationship with the class community and with the interview subjects.
- Create and enact a protocol of care for the interview participant and self-care.
- Collaborate with peers to create and plan a structured interview process.
- Integrate knowledge of the community/event into the interview process.
- Collaborate in small groups to plan, conduct and transcribe multiple interviews with the same subject.
- Compile and shape interview transcripts into a memoir, applying conventions of the genre.
- Revise memoirs to integrate interview subject's editorial preferences.
- Collaborate with peers to assist in planning and hosting a wrap-up event for the writing partners and community.
- Reflect on the personal and community impact of recording writing partner's personal history
